Listen to the Voice of Creation

Many churches across the world set September as the Season of Creation. This year Bathurst Uniting Church is joining in. Each



Sunday, morning and evening, our worship will be on the theme of "Listening to the Voice of Creation." We are encouraged as we read the Bible readings to think about how they speak to the theme. Those who use the daily devotional With Love to the World, will have noticed that the contributors have been invited to focus on questions relating to the care of the environment, living sustainably, and demonstrating responsible stewardship of the earth's resources, as integral to our discipleship, to our worship of God, witness of faith through word and deed, and serving others in the name of Christ.

Governments and many businesses are onboard with reducing emissions. Both State and Federal governments have set targets for significant emissions reductions. Our Bathurst City Council has set an Emission Reduction Plan that includes 25% reductions by 2025, and 60% reductions in emissions by 2035. Our Council has signed an agreement for supply of 100% renewable electricity for its large sites and streetlighting from 1 January 2023. Electric Utes were in the news this part week and a number of vehicle manufacturers have commenced production of electric Utes which will arrive in Australia over the next few years. Many businesses are going solar power, passive heating and cooling, and electric vehicles. A new seven-star rating has been released for buildings and homes that meet certain criteria of low emissions.

The Bible speaks into the matter of creation. The Genesis creation myth portrays God as seeing everything that was made and being pleased (Genesis 1:1-2:3). The Psalms speak of creation praising God. Psalm 19 "The heavens are declaring the glory of God." Psalm 148 exhorts the whole of creation to praise God: angels, heavenly hosts, sun, moon, stars, mountains, waters, beasts, beasts and all cattle, all people are to praise God. Nothing is excluded from the call to praise God. There are many more Psalms that continue the theme. The Bible suggests that by their very being, plants, birds, animals, landforms, fish, and humans praise God. The writer of the letter to the Colossians speaks of the cosmic Christ who came to redeem the entirety of Creation. The resurrection of Jesus is good news for the entirety of Creation.

Not only did St Francis and his sister Clare of Assisi model and speak of the whole creation worshipping God, but many others as well. The Reformer Martin Luther, John Calvin and John and Charles Wesley also wrote

extensively of both the way in which the whole of creation praises God, and of caring for God's good creation.

Notice the language. The language of creation contrasts to the language of nature. The language of creation suggests a Creator. The language of nature is suggestive of atheism, of self-creation. The language of creation is suggestive it was created. Who by? If God, what does it mean that God created the entirety of creation? What right do we have to destroy what is God's, created by God and assessed as being good by God? What moral responsibility do we have as people of faith to look after that which we believe God created? If we are accountable to God for our life, would that also include how we cared for or abused God's creation?

Creation is easily changed and destroyed. Since Julie and I moved into our house at Llanarth in June 2021, we have planted more than 40 trees and shrubs. I am mindful that my own parents in their house of 31 years at Wentworthville planted thousands of trees and shrubs and vegetables. It had such an impact on one of my sisters and her husband that they live on 15 hectares (37 acres) near Kempsey. And one of our daughters was inspired to become a horticulturalist. When mum and dad sold the house and moved into their retirement, they then proceeded to fill the yard with trees and shrubs. But the new owners of the house at Wentworthville removed the entirety of the garden and landscaping at the front of the house. Successive owners have removed the entirety of the garden at the rear of the house so that now it is devoid of any trees.

Creation is both fragile and resilient. Our influence can be significant and long-term, as well as short-lived. We can easily destroy landforms, create erosion, pollute waters ways and air, and change weather patterns. My late Grandfather, an electrician, pondered the effect on weather patterns, including rainfall, of the magnetic field produced by very high voltage powerlines running across many kilometres. The very high voltage powerlines create such a large magnetic field they must be on very high towers, up to 60 metres (200 feet) away from humans. Likewise, I often marvel at how bare paddocks can be reforested, and how when a house is removed and concrete lifted, even after 100 years, green shoots quickly appear.

I suppose we can work with God in the care of God's good creation, or we can use and abuse and trash it. We make the choice. And our choice will be influenced by who is our God, and how big is our God? A question to ponder is, how can we *Listen to the Voice of Creation?*

On two Sundays after church and morning tea, 11 September and 25 September, 11:30-12:30 we will have an opportunity to explore further the theme of the season of creation – *Listen to the Voice of Creation*. We shall meet in the foyer of our church.
